PROGRAMME NOTES

This ALL RUSSIAN programme again raises the contradiction -- how can such a dour people and harsh country produce such imagination, romantic and beautiful music (atleast the contradiction is in the westerner's mind).

But to our Conductor, Matthew Krel, this music is completely natural for he came from Moscow some 9 years ago, and this is the music of his homeland. No one would describe Matthew as a "dull, dour Russian!"

I is very good to be joining with the Sydney University Musical Society (SUMS) Choir. This Society has been singing at the University for 100 years, providing a musical outlet for university people be they engineers, economists or whatever. Many thanks to them and their Conductor, Ben Macpherson.

Piano Concerto No.2

Sergei Rachmaninoff (1873-1943)

Rachmaninoff wrote this concerto in 1901 performing it himself in London. Earlier he had played his Biano Concerto in Russia and England, but it was not accepted. This greatly depressed him, and the second Piano Concerto was written soon after, following considerable medical attention. It was dedicated to his doctor.

I as an instant success and no doubt expressed much of the emotions of the disappointment of his earlier concerto. It is beautifully romantic, flowing with melody and form that comes from the heart. His friendship with Tchaikovsky shows the latter's influence. However, Rachmaninoff left Russia in the turmoil of 1917, going to America. There he was always a great favourite, dying in California in 1943 aged 70. He always pined for his homeland, but never returned. For many years Russia rejected his music as representing "the decadent attitude of the lower middle classes." But later this attitude was reversed and he died a national hero.

"Vespers" is seldom sung, but is an unaccompanied work of Rachmaninoff in 1915 and shows his versatility. It was written for use in the mass.

Nutcracker Suite

Peter I. Tchaikovsky (1840-93)

The ballet is a major part of Russian culture, and in this field they really excel.

Tchaikovsky wrote this Suite for the ballet in 1892, one year before he died in St. Petersberg during a cholera epidemic at the age of 53. It is simple, pure and precise ballet music but its beauty and ingenuity have made it perhaps the most popular of Tchaikovsky's three ballet suites.

Polovtsian Dances

Alexander Borodin (1833-87)

Borodin was born in 1833 in St. Petersberg and became a medical man, music being a side line. He did not produce a vast quantity of music, and he always regarded his opera "Prince Igor" as his greatest effort, although he did not have time to finish it. These Dances are now his most popular work. It was first performed in 1879. He died in 1887 at St. Petersberg.

The wild rhythms and harmonies of this music makes for a most exciting musical experience, as great contrast to the romance and beauty of the other works on this Russian programme.
