#### PROGRAMME NOTES

Symphony No.4 (C Minor) TRAGIC F. Schubert(1797-1828)

Schubert wrote nine symphonies in his very short life. The fourth, written in 1816, when only 19 years old, is not often heard, being considered the product of youth. is hard to understand for we have come to love the exuberance of this great symphony. Beauty of melody and orchestration pour from each movement in the happiest possible manner. It is, therefore, also hard to understand how the title TRAGIC came about. We can only guess that the long opening Adagio, which is indeed a sombre statement, caused the misleading title to be given. For the remainder of the symphony is full of happiness and joy.

The young genius Schubert wrote so much great music in his younger years, his first symphony was when he was only 16. But he lived amongst the greats of the musical world in Vienna, being 27 years younger than Beethoven, whom he greatly admired.

He was buried beside Beethoven in Vienna dying one year later than his idol. In his symphony can be hard his wonderful use of modulation and key changing, no doubt influenced by Beethoven.

Variations on a Theme of Haydn J. Brahms (1833-1897)

Like Schubert, Brahms saw Beethoven as The Master and also lived the last half of his life in Vienna although 50 years later than Beethoven. His compositions brought the Romantic Period of music to a climax. And his Work is typical, being full of inventive complexities that leave the listener carried into new realms of wonder at his genius.

Certainly the players of this orchestra while struggling with this work, have marvelled at his music, its ingenuity, starting afresh at each new variation.

It is hard to reconcile this with the reputation he had for abruptness, rudeness and bad temper, particularly towards women:

Our third Composer tonight was also Viennese, although he lived many years earlier. He wrote an enormous quantity of music for every occasion, including the Church.

This Work, Te Deum Laudammus (We Praise Thee O God), has been the great traditional hymn of praise of the christian church since the 5th century. It has taken its place in the church liturgy in times of rejoicing. So it is ideal for setting to music of joy, although sometimes it can be wondered whether the music is more suited for the concert hall or the church.

Tonight the choir sings in Latin, the original language setting. This presents difficulties these days in determining the correct pronunciation for it is now so seldom spoken. It is, therefore, good to hear the Latin version, as it was originally conceived.

We are very pleased to have the Choirs of Bankstown City, Strathfield Choral Society and St. Andrew's Uniting Church, Eastwood, singing with us.
