PROGRAMME NOTES

Symphony No. 39 in E Flat MOZART Wolfgang A.

(1756 - 1791)

Mozart wrote 41 recognized symphonies. The one we play to-night is, therefore, near the end of his great career and shows the dramatic deepening of his compositions that is found at that stage of his life (1788). He died in 1791.

It is a symphony not so often played as the other "named" symphonies he wrote at that time. Nonethe-less, it is a great work. it's movements are:

- 1) Adagio Allegro
- 2) Andante
- 3) Minuet
- 4) Allegro

Melody in F

RUBINSTEIN Anton (1829 - 1894)

Rubinstein was a great pianist and a composer, although few of his works are now played. The exception is Melody in F, which is universally popular. It was originally written for viola and piano, but has been adapted for orchestra with a cello solo

Our soloist is JUDITH FRENCH who is studying for the Bachelor of Music at the Sydney Conservatorium. She also plays with the Australian Youth Orchestra

Horn Concerto No. 3 in E Major MOZART Wolfgang A. (1756 - 1791)

Mozart wrote this Concerto in 1783, when the French Horn was in early days of its final development before valves were developed. So, we may hear more a hunting type horn than the modern 3 keyed horn.

Our soloist, **GRAHAM NICHOLS**, moved to Sydney in 1988 from Tasmania and now plays in the NSW Police Concert Band. He studies with Robert Johnson of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra

Ballet Music from "Faust"

GOUNOD Charles (1818 - 1893)

Gounod wrote his grand opera "Faust" in 1859, and it is still one of the most popular operas in the repertoire. This was not so when it was first performed in Paris. Generally, people were critical of a lack of melody and they said it could not be understood. This will seem hard for us to appreciate to-night, for this selection of the Ballet music is full of great melodies and wonderful rhythms.

It has seven parts, each a different dance
